



IBN-I SINA (980-1037)

Ibn-i Sina (b. 980, Bukhara, Uzbekistan and d. 1037, Hamedan, Iran) also known as Abu Al Sina, Avicenna was a Persian polymath. He was regarded as one of the most significant physicians, astronomers, philosophers during the Islamic Golden Age and also the father of the early modern medicine. His surviving

works include 150 books on philosophy and 40 on medicine, but actual figure is believed to be written by him was around 450. His most famous works, The Book of Healing and The Canon of Medicine, both medical encyclopedias were standard medical texts at many medieval universities.
